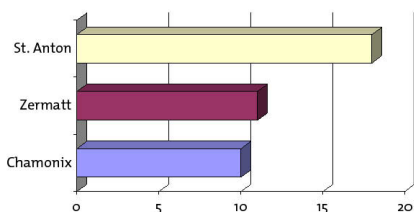
Here are some highlights:

FIFTH ANNUAL LAKE PLACID HIKE

This year 30 Fall Line hikers (including 9 new members who joined to go on the hike) converged on Lake Placid for the 5th year anniversary hike. Last-minute cancellations and additions made the planning a little crazy and resulted in some creative room assignments.

Bob Homan was one of our last-minute additions. He had just returned from his cross-country travels two days before and had decided join us, apparently suffering from cabin fever in his big house. After 5 years of attacking the Adirondack high peaks, Juan Carro has the most number of climbs to his credit. If you include the snowshoe hike he and I went on several years ago, Juan has completed 10 high peaks, with only 36 to go to become a 46^{er}.

This year we had a better balance among the hikes with fewer choosing to go on the advanced hike. With the quicker breakfast (the same thing for everyone) for the advanced hike, we actually left within 5 minutes of our planned departure.

Eight hikers set out on the advanced hike to summit Gothics. We were able to stay together as a group, although one hiker suffered from leg cramps and wisely turned back. With a smaller group we were able to make last-minute changes. After several hours we came across a fork in the trail and as they say, we took it. It was a longer route to Gothics over two more peaks, Upper Wolf Jaw and Armstrong. Our route didn't take us down the famed cables of Gothics as I had originally planned but Sofia Dobkin, who can never pass up a challenge, insisted we go down to see the cables. This little detour added another 1/2 mile or more to our trip for a total of 14 miles.

We were surprised to see all the damage caused by Hurricane Floyd. Part of our route resembled hiking the herd paths on the unmaintained trails, also known as the trailless peaks, where you often have to climb over or under, what is referred to as blowdown—large trees ripped out by the roots. Blowdown is never cleared from the herd paths of the trailless peaks to maintain the challenge experienced by the original adventurers.

The blowdown on our way up was not so bad and, fortunately, a trail-maintenance crew with chain saws was on its way up to clear the damage. Without any exaggeration we met the crew members on our way down just as they were cutting away their last tree (our first) blocking our way. We actually helped them drag the tree off the path. The crew informed us that we would have been another two hours getting out if we had to navigate all the blowdown. As it was we hiked out the last hour in the dark along a dirt road which parallels the trail.

Steve Wright took over as trail guide for one of the two intermediate hikes. Everyone thought he did a good job. Steve and three of his group went on to climb the optional peak, which added several more miles to his hike. The only complaint I heard was this: "He's not as pretty as last year's guide."

Mike Gramsammer was our trail guide for the other

intermediate hike. It was a long 12-mile hike with less elevation gain than the other hikes so some may have thought it was easy. But only four people—Marge Kondoleon, Betty Demers, Dave Friedman and "Yukon" Laurie D'Agostino—reached the end destination. Rumor has it that Marge found two handsome admirers along the trail. I understand they assisted Marge and Betty across a creek so they wouldn't get their feet wet. Hikers are known for their all-around friendliness but nobody said that they helped Mike across the creek.

The hikes are still going strong with lots of members telling me they want to return so I'm already planning for next year. Look for some interesting changes.

A HOLIDAY GIFT THAT EATS LIKE A MEAL

If you have a car and you'd like to get involved in one of South Jersey's largest annual holiday food distribution efforts, here's your chance.

Sacred Heart Church in South Camden is looking for volunteers from Fall Line to help distribute holiday food baskets to needy families in the neighborhood. The distribution will take place on Saturday morning, Dec. 18. Nearly a dozen Fall Liners participated in last year's food distribution and helped make it a roaring success.

This year, volunteers are being asked to show up between 9 and 9:15 a.m. in the basement of Sacred Heart, Broadway and Ferry Avenue in South Camden. Hundreds of pre-packed baskets of chicken, turkey and canned goods will be packed, labeled and ready for delivery.

Volunteers with cars will be needed to spend a few hours making those deliveries.

The families were pre-selected so they know you'll be coming. All you have to do is find them and drop off their food baskets. You can put as few or as many baskets in your car as you'd like. You'll work with one or two partners in driver/navigator teams, completing as many deliveries as possible and bringing back any baskets that could not be delivered. If you come alone and don't have a partner, don't worry; the organizers will find a partner or two for you.

Think of it as a holiday scavenger hunt. City maps and lists of families with their addresses will be distributed to each volunteer. Bushel baskets filled with either frozen turkeys or chickens and other goods will be color-coded to help volunteers deliver the right baskets to the right people. The organizational effort will amaze you.

Tip for drivers: it's a good idea to line your trunk with a drop cloth or plastic bag.

Fall Line's Janice Lynch will be there to provide maps and to orient and instruct volunteers. Harry Gould will be participating in deliveries. Why not join us on the Saturday before Christmas? The more the merrier. (P.S.: Wear warm clothing).
