NO TICKETS WILL BE SOLD AT THE DOOR!

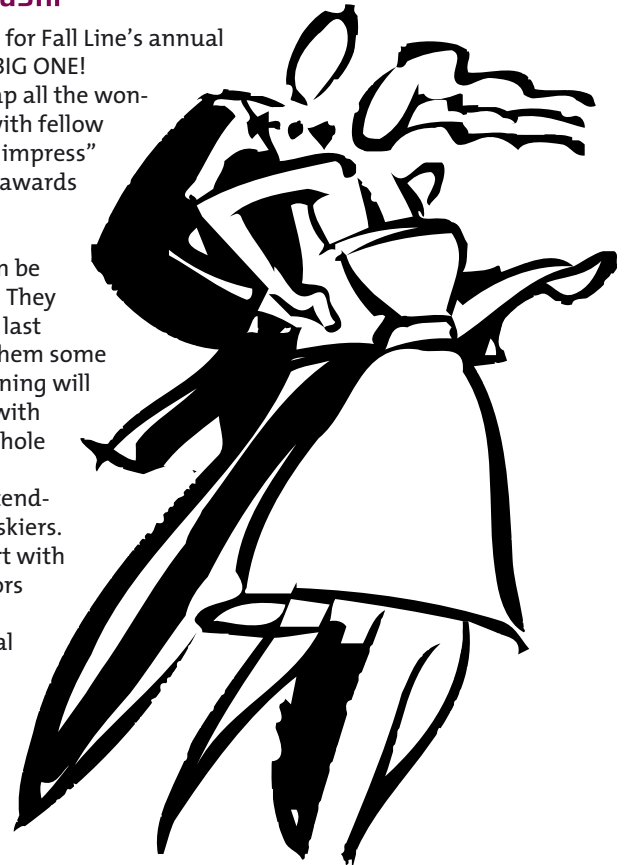

We knew we were off to a great start when snowfall greeted us as we approached our destination, Brook Haven condos.

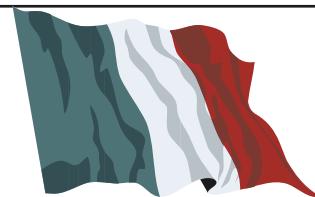

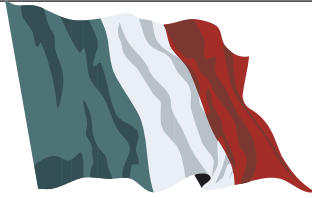

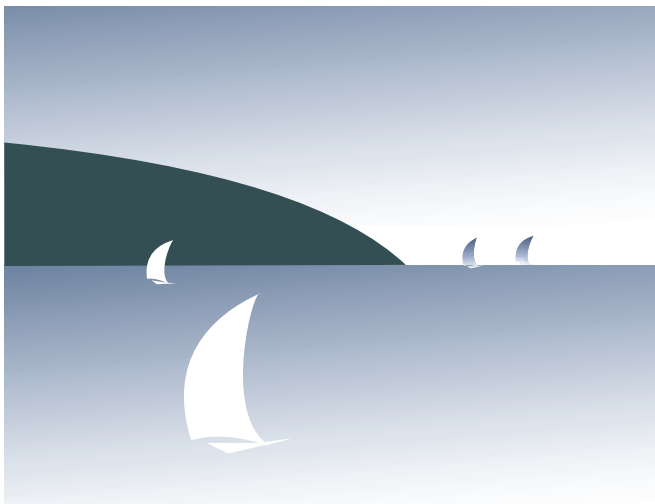
