Hike, Kayak or Watch a Rodeo - Paul's Summer Activities

Sunday, June 9, 8:30 a.m. - Hike Wissahickon Gorge

Eight miles moderate pace over hills. Bring picnic type food to share at tailgate social after hike. Meet in rear parking lot Hilton Hotel, on Rte. 70 Cherry Hill to carpool/caravan. Or meet at 9:30 a.m. at Valley Green parking lot in park. With OCSJ. (Outdoor Club of South Jersey) (No charge)

Visit a bit of outdoor heaven in Philadelphia. Yes, there is a wilderness area in Philadelphia with rolling hills, streams and wildlife (animal type that is). Hike various terrains from hills to flat roads. The Wissahickon is beautiful in late spring with all the various trees and foliage in full bloom. Hiking boots are required since there is rocky terrain and muddy spots in some places that we hike.

Saturday, June 15, 7:30 p.m. - Cowtown Rodeo, Woodstown, NJ

Come out and enjoy some southern-style entertainment without passing the Mason-Dixon Line. There will be bareback riding, calf-roping, steer-wrestling, team roping, and bull-riding. And female riders get into the action also with girl's barrel racing, roping and reeling. After the dusty activities we will mosey on down the road to a local watering hole to wash down some of the trail dust. Show starts at 7:30 p.m., we will meet at the rear parking lot of the Hilton Hotel, Rte. 70, Cherry Hill to carpool/caravan down to Woodstown or meet by the entrance gate there at 7:25 p.m. Cost will be \$12.00 per person.

Friday, July 26, 6:30 p.m.-Midnight - Singles Moonlight Kayak Trip

Paddling experience required. Limited space, call leader to reserve space. No children. Meet at Bel Haven Canoe Rentals, on Rte. 543, 12 miles east of Hammonton, Atlantic County. Bring flashlight and whistle. With OCSJ. Cost is \$27.00 per person.

Paddle the Mullica River under a full moon. The power boats and jet skis are all put away for the evening, all that you hear is the sound of your paddle dipping into the water as you propel your kayak through the water. Occasionally seeing a Great Heron taking flight or a jumping fish in the water. You are rewarded for all your effort when the moon gently rises above the horizon and lights the river and evening sky with its soft golden glow. Some paddling experience is necessary. No alcohol is allowed on the rivers while operating a watercraft. Optional dinner at Sweetwater Casino after the paddle.

Friday, August 10, 7:30 p.m. - Singles Hike and Meteor Shower

Five-six miles moderate pace. Bring snack type food to share at tailgate social after hike, blanket or chair to sit on. No pets or children. Meet in field behind Atsion Office on Rte. 206, between Red Lion Circle and Hammonton, Burlington County. With OCSJ. (No charge)

Take a hike! On this warm summer's night through the Pine Barrens and then enjoy a solar light display! The Perseid Meteor shower is a solar system spectacular spectacle! Watch meteors blaze into balls of burning light as they enter the Earth's atmosphere and give off their brilliant light show. In the past few years there has been an average of about 5-6 meteors per minute. Bring a lawn chair or blanket to sit in the open field to watch. Bring snack type food to share with others as we watch the show. No alcoholic beverages please since it is a state park area.

Saturday, August 24, 7:30 p.m. - Moonlight Hike

Seven miles, moderate pace. Hike dirt roads lit by moonlight in the Pines. Bring swim wear for dip after hike. Bring snack type food to share at tailgate social after hike. No pets or children. Meet at Lake Oswego parking lot on Lake Oswego Road. Off Rte. 563, 8 miles South of Chadsworth, Burlington County. With OCSJ. (No charge) No alcohol since it is a state park.

Do something abnormal! Hike in the woods at night! Hike the Pine Barrens under the light of a full moon. Not to worry you won't get lost and you won't need a flashlight to see. The moonlight will be brilliant as it reflects off the white sand roads and lights up the night, walking is easy since we hike on old grave-stone flat roads. Bring a picnic type food to share at a tailgate social after the hike. Also bring a swim suit as we will take a dip in the lake to cool down after the hike. Since this is a state park, alcohol is not permitted.

Breckenridge, Summit County, Colorado

Fall Line Kayaking Adventures/Happy Hour

Join Fall Liners for the 2nd Annual Egg Harbor Kayak & Happy Hour on Saturday, August 17, 2002. Last year we had a fabulous turnout, the weather was beautiful and a good time was had by all! This will be a day filled with fun, friends, food and sport as we meander down the cool waters of the Great Egg River in Weymouth, New Jersey (9 miles west of the Hamilton Mall). The best day in nature awaits you. It's clean, relaxing and refreshing waters are surrounded by some of the most beautiful scenery in South Jersey. See deer, ducks, turtles, fish

and more. The Great Egg Harbor River begins in a suburban town and meanders for 59 miles, draining 304 square miles of pristine wetlands in the heart of New Jersey's Pinelands Reserve on the way to the Atlantic Ocean.

Our group will meet at Palace Pizza & Outfitters, where we will be shuttled upriver to our point of departure. You can choose to kayak (single and double kayaks available) or canoe. We will float down a narrow, tree-lined river with water depths ranging from 1 to 6 feet. This is a beginner to intermediate, non-whitewater

trip, and a great opportunity for first-time kayakers to get their feet wet (no pun intended). Our journey down river should take about 3 hours (*a three hour tour... a three hour tour*). We will rendezvous after our adventure back at Palace Outfitters for food, fun and refreshments (and, of course, beer, in true Fall Line tradition).
