We started at Deer Valley and the weather gods would smile on us that day as they did all week. Six days of blue skies and temps warming up to the upper 20’s during the day. A strong sun block was in order. 

The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics by Daniel James Brown

The #1 *New York Times*-bestselling story about American Olympic triumph in Nazi Germany and now the inspiration for the PBS documentary "The Boys of '36'."


